The research article should be written in either English and should not exceed 8 pages of A4-sized paper. The text should be in Times New Roman, 12-point font size. Figures, tables, and charts can be included, but they must be within the 8-page limit. The page margins should be set to 1 inch on the top, bottom, left, and right
